Bangladesh Navy

The Bangladesh Navy will have its first submarine by 2019, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said, adding Dhaka wants to amicably resolve its maritime boundary issue with neighbours India and Myanmar as it does not want 'a war in the region'.

Hasina said the Bangladesh Navy will have its first submarine with base facility by 2019 and added that her government's plans were to build 'an effective deterrent force'.


She made the announcement while commissioning the navy's first hydrographic survey ship 'Anusandhan' at Isha Khan Naval Base.

Hasina quoted her father and the country's founding leader, the kate president Sheikh Mujibur Rahman as saying that Bangladesh would not interfere in anyone's internal affairs, but if others try to interfere in Bangladesh's internal matters, it would also not be tolerated.

About differences with the neighbouring countries over maritime boundaries, Hasina said efforts are under way to solve the problems. 'We do not want any war or conflict in this region. We believe in peace,' the United News of Bangladesh (UNB) news agency quoted her as saying.

Hasina said the navy will be developed as a modern and well equipped force in the future to boldly resist illegal trespass by foreign ships into Bangladesh territory and to stop smuggling through the sea.





MAKING WAVES: HMS Torbay on patrol

OST of us have experience of Lusing Microsoft Windows on a home computer but HMS Torbay became the first Royal Navy vessel to put to sea using it.

The new computer-driven command system was termed SMCS-NG.

Barrow's Trafalgar-class product has another claim to fame in its colour.

Torbay participated in an experiment in the use of colour schemes to reduce the visibility of submarines from the air.

In 2006, the standard black paint of Royal Navy submarines was replaced by a carefully selected shade of blue.

This was the result of research which found that black was the worst possible colour for a submarine attempting to avoid detection from the air.

This has become a more important factor as a result of the changing nature of Royal Navy commitments since the end of the Cold War.

Naval operations have moved from the murky waters of the North Atlantic to the clearer waters of the Arabian Sea and the Indian Ocean.

Torbay completed a refuel and modernisation process in February 2001.

In 2008 Torbay was back at sea as the most powerful in the fleet with a new state-of-the-art missile system.

The boat was out of action for more than year for the major refit at Faslane on the Clyde.

It allowed the submarine to send and receive email was submerged.

The biggest change was the latest longer-range Block IV version of the Tomahawk cruise missile.

Torbay could launch missile strikes from sea on land targets from a range of up to 1,000 miles.

The missile system could also retarget or safely abort in flight and relay images en route to boost intelligence gathering.

Virginia Is Flayed Alive

The special material attached to the outside of American Virginia class submarines has been peeling off. The special material absorbs sonar signals, making the Virginias harder to detect. This an old technique, dating back to World War II, when the Germans invented the concept and installed it on their subs in 1940. The adhesive attaching the material to the hull did not work so well, and it took the Germans another four years before they developed an adhesive that seemed to hold. But the adhesive problems persisted after the war, and to the present. The the adhesive for absorbing (or "anechoic") material on the Virginias was tested extensively, but it still fails under some conditions, after several years of use. The U.S. Navy is now working on finding out what is causing the problem. Russian subs have long had the same problem, and do not appear to have developed a perfect solution either. When the "anechoic" material comes loose, it actually makes the subs noisier, because of how the water flows over the area where the material has come loose. If the material comes off in strips that stay attached to the sub, that makes even more noise, and the subs becomes even more vulnerable to enemy detection.

The U.S. has similar problems with the anti-radar material

used on stealth aircraft. The problem is so severe with these aircraft that they require much more maintenance than non-stealth aircraft, to keep the anti-radar (or "radar signal absorbing) material in good repair.

Currently, the U.S. has seven of the new, 7,700 ton, Virginia class SSNs in service, three under construction and plans eventually build 30. The mainstay of the American submarine force is still the 6,100 ton Los Angeles-class SSN. Sixty-two of these submarines were built, 44 of which remain in front-line service, making it probably the of nuclear largest class submarines that will ever be built. The Seawolf-class of nuclear attack submarines stopped at three from a planned class of twenty-nine. The 8,600 ton Seawolf was designed as a super-submarine, designed to fight the Soviet Navy at its height. Reportedly, it is quieter going 40 kilometers an hour, than the Los Angeles-class submarines are at pier side, partly because of the anechoic material on its hull.

Portugal Class 209PNDeisels

Portugal took delivery of the second of two Class 209PN diesel submarines, the NRP Arpao, handed over at the Baltic coast shipyards of Howaldtswerke- Deutsche Werft.

In August, the navy took delivery of the Arpao's sister ship Tridente.

The handover to the Portuguese navy and the ship's commissioning at HDW in Kiel, Germany, completes the \$1 billion contract signed with the German submarine consortium in 2004 for the two yessels.

But controversy surrounding the contract is far from over.

The sale is under investigation

in Germany and Portugal for alleged bribes that were made in exchange for contracts won by GSC, which includes the naval shipbuilders HDW and Ferrostaal.

The Portuguese inquiry is focusing on seven Portuguese nationals and three Germans for allegedly submitting false bills in connection with the contract.

The ships were built by ThyssenKrupp Marine Systems through GSC. The consortium comprises its subsidiary HDW, industrial power and project management Ferrostaal AG, based in Essen, Germany, and shipyard Nordseewerke, a subsidiary of Schaaf Industrie AG, based on the River Em near Germany's Baltic coast.

Nordseewerke builds naval, freight and container ships as well as cruise liners, including the Pacific Princess, which was the film location for the U.S. "The Love television series **Boat."Portugal's** class 209 vessels have many upgrades found on the improved class 214 submarine. The 223-foot vessels displace 1,840 tons, accommodate a crew of 32 and have air-independent, fuel-cell propulsion systems.

The class 209 and 214 ships are a modular design from the late 1960s and aimed specifically at the export market. None are known to have been bought by the German navy but more that 60 units have been sold to 14 navies with many variants depending on client requirements.

The first ship was ordered by Greece in 1967 for commissioning in 1971. Other buyers include Chile, Brazil, Turkey, Indonesia and South Korea. Turkey has been the biggest purchaser, picking up six.

Costs have been kept down by making the vessel a distinctly German product from known suppliers. These include Siemens for propulsion motors and electric control systems, MTU for the four diesel engines and generators, Varta and

Hagen for battery supply, Zeiss for periscopes and Gabler Maschinenbau for snorkel and antennae.

However, radar and fire controlsystems are supplied by Dutch company HSA, French manufacturer Thomson, U.S. company Singer Librascope and British firm Ferranti.

HDW is one of Germany's oldest shipyards. It was started in 1838 and survived the dismantling of post-war Germany's shipyards after 1945. It continued to make ships and was eventually bought by ThyssenKrupp Marine Systems in January 2005.

HDW is one of several ThyssenKrupp Marine Systems units that include Kockums in Malmo, Sweden; and Hellenic Shipyards in Skaramangas, Greece.

In 2009, HDW worked with Kockums and Northrop Grumman to offer a Swedish Visby class stealth corvette derivative in the American Focused Mission Vessel Study, a precursor to United States near-shore Littoral Combat Ship program

HMS Sceptre



IT WAS the end of an era at **Devonport Naval Base when the** last of the class of Swiftsure attack submarines was retired after 32 years' service.

HMS Sceptre was formally decommissioned at a special ceremony which saw tributes paid to her role, and the hundreds of submariners who served onboard.

Commander Steve Waller, the 16th and final commanding officer of the vessel, said the occasion marked more than the end of a submarine in service, but also the end of an era of Swiftsure submarines.



He said: "This is a momentous occasion, as it marks the last of the Swiftsure Class.

"It is a sad moment, but we should also use it to remember and celebrate the achievements of the submarine and of the men have between who them protected the UK's interests for 32 years.

"This longevity is testament to the UK workforce. Indeed in the last nine months of service, including a long deployment, the boat has lost only six days due to faults."

He said HMS Sceptre's crew, past and present, were one large close-knit family which made up a happy community while at sea.

The vital support was obvious among the sailors and their families back home, he said, especially important during long deployments, like the eightmonth, 31,000-mile patrol to the Indian and Atlantic Oceans earlier this year.

HMS Sceptre, a nuclearpowered submarine, entered service in 1978 and it is estimated around 1,500 men have served on board during her time.

The decommissioning ceremony, which was witnessed by 450 people, was conducted by Royal Naval Chaplain the Rev Bernard Clarke.

Special guest was Michael Winstanley, the Mayor of Wigan, the town which the submarine has long been affiliated to.

He told the parade: "I am honoured to have had such a long and happy association with HMS Sceptre. But this occasion is tinged with sadness at the parting of the ways."

The mayor said HMS Sceptre had done the Royal Navy and proud Wigan and the submarine "held a special place in Wigan's heart."

He said that he and Wigan saluted the submarine and all her men for their achievements and that, despite her age, HMS Sceptre served at the forefront of naval operations, serving her country right to the last.

"The real heart and soul of the submarine are the people here on parade," said Mr Winstan-

"Submarine service is seen as more than a life, more of a religion to them."

He added that the various crews of HMS Sceptre had shown the "utmost professionalism and loyalty" throughout their years of service on board and delivered "outstanding service" with "undying pride".

However, the whole town is now out of debt and looking to the future with a lot more optimism. And that, ladies and gentlemen, is how the bailout package works.



LATEST PRODUCT: Crowds at the Barrow launch of *HMS Torbay* on March 8 in 1985


























The Submarine Heritage Centre (SHC) and the Submariners Association (SA) of Barrow in Furness have commissioned a series of Paintings, by a notable local Marine Artist – Tom Murphy, of all the Classes of Submarine built in the Barrow Shipyard over the last 120 years. The Barrow Shipyard has been involved with the design and built over 72% of all UK Submarines plus a good number for foreign Navies. This Paintings Series represents the development of the Submarine over that period and reflects the development of the Submarine, from the first basic vessel in the 1880's to the sophisticated Nuclear powered Submarine of the 21st Century.

The SHC and the SA have now put together a Book to showcase these paintings and supporting data. The Book contains plates covering the forty four Classes of Submarine built in Barrow together with a number of Submarines built for other countries. It also includes twelve 'Decade' paintings reflecting the products, other than the Submarine, produced by the Shipyard over that same period and a further ten plates of 'Miscellaneous' paintings of Ships, Submarines and topics related to the Barrow Shipyard. The Book is a "Coffee Table" hard back product with the Painting Plates on the right hand pages with associated information on the left hand pages.

The Book was 'launched' by Rear Admiral Paddy O'Riordan – the 6th Commanding Officer of HMS DREADNOUGHT - during the recent 50th Anniversary of Nuclear Submarines celebrations in the Dock Museum in Barrow.
