Submarine Tales

Whilst searching the net for submarine stories of interest for our newsletter I discovered the following tale. A discovery by a deep sea diving team could bring to the surface fresh details of Shchuka Class Submarine a



WW2 tragedy off the coast of Romania. Divers believe they have located the wreck of a notorious Soviet submarine that disappeared during World War Two. A Romanian and Dutch team made the find two years ago. But only now are they convinced it is the Shchuka Class submarine that sunk a ship carrying Jewish refugees. "The problem was that the wreck was completely covered in seashells, silt and fishnets," said Dutch diver Harry Bakker. "We have made several dives just to clean the wreck and finally, after we cleaned it, we started to discover some parts that brought us close to the submarine's identity. "The discovery of the wreck not far from the port of Constanta has focussed fresh attention on the Struma disaster. Carrying more than 700 Jewish refugees fleeing Romania to head to the then Palestine, the ship was turned away from the coast of Turkey, and cast out to sea without fuel, food or water. It is thought a Soviet submarine torpedoed it after mistaking it for a German vessel. All but one refugee drowned.

Chaplains Dit March 2011

The time of Lent is upon us so I thought it a good time to write a short Dit about the most important event on the Christian Calendar. Lent is the forty-day liturgical season of fasting, special prayer and almsgiving in preparation for Easter. The

name "Lent" is from the Middle English Lenten and Anglo-Saxon Lenten, meaning spring; its more primitive ecclesiastical name was the "forty days," tessaracoste in Greek.

The number "forty" is first noted in the Canons of Nicaea (A.D. 325), likely in imitation of Jesus' fast in the desert before His public ministry (with Old Testament precedence in Moses and Elijah). By the fourth century, in most of the West, it referred to six days' fast per week of six weeks (Sundays were excluded); in the seventh century the days from Ash Wednesday through the First Sunday were added to make the number forty. In 2011, the 40day season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 9. Good Friday is April 22, Holy Saturday is April 23, and Easter Sunday is April 24. Pretzels: A Lenten treat originated in **Europe during the Middle Ages.** A monk was making unleavened bread for Lent with flour and water because eggs, milk and lard were not consumed as part of the Lenten fast. He twisted some of the dough into the shape of people praying with both arms folded across their chests. He decided it would be a perfect treat for children learning to say their prayers. He called the treats pretiola, the Latin word for "little reward."

An anecdotal tale that I may have told before One of my granddaughters was asked by her mother what she was giving up for Lent her reply was that she would give up eating sprouts to which her mother replied nice try but you have never eaten them !!!!!!.

EXPERIMENTAL: The submarine HMS Explorer seen in Barrow docks

HMS Explorer was an experimental British submarine based on a captured German high test peroxide U-boat.

AT SEA: HMS Explorer is put through her

U-1407 had been scuttled following the German collapse at the end of the Second World War, was salvaged and commissioned by the Royal Navy as *HMS Meteorite*.

This gave the impetus for a British research programme resulting in the construction of two experimental submarines, *HMS Explorer* and *HMS Excalibur*.

Both were built for speed trials and

were unarmed. Their HTP engines were essentially steam turbines, with the steam being generated by the interaction of HTP with diesel oil and a catalyst.

Explorer suffered from so many teething troubles that her first captain never took her to sea.

When these problems were solved, she turned out to be impressively fast, achieving submerged speeds of 25 knots (46.3 km/h), aided by her streamlined hull and retractable fittings.

Both Explorer and her sister ship

were fitted with the latest underwater escape technology, including a one-man escape chamber, and equipped with up to date escape breathing apparatus.

Explorer and Excalibur were popularly known as the 'blonde' submarines because of their hydrogen peroxide fuel.

They served as high-speed targets for the Royal Navy's anti-submarine forces

Their main use was to finally prove that HTP was impractical as an airindependent propulsion for submarine use.

The Committee will look into this to see what might be arranged.

One other event in February and attended Branch by Members was the unveiling of a new Memorial to James Freel (the Barrow born Charioteer) on Friday 11th February.

This Memorial (sponsored by the Town Hall) is sited at the end of James Freel Close overlooking the Walney Channel and the Memorial (by an Ulverston sculptor) based is impressive and well worth going to see. It was unveiled by the Mayor and Mayoress and John Freel a nephew of James Freel. Submarine HMS URGE



HMS URGE was ordered as part of the 1939 Emergency War Programme and was built at the Barrow-in-Furness Yard of Vickers Armstrong Ltd.

The Submarine was ordered on 4th Sep 1939, was laid down at Barrow on 30th Oct 1939 and was launched on 19th Aug 1940 and was completed on 12th Dec 1940.

After 'Contractors Sea Trials' and 'Working Up' patrols in Home Waters HMS URGE Lieutenant Edward P Tomkinson, Royal Navy) was sent to the Mediterranean to join firstly the 8th Submarine Flotilla based on the Submarine Depot Ship HMS MAIDSTONE at Gibraltar and

then the 1st Submarine Flotilla based on HMS St ANGELO at Malta. Also on board for the passage was Lieutenant Ian McGeoch, Royal Navy who was to be the 'Spare Commanding Officer'.

Whilst on the way to Malta on 18th Apr 1941 Submarine HMS URGE made an attack on the 10,585 ton Italian **Tanker** FŔANCO **MARTELLI** position 46° 51'N 08° 29'E in the Bay of Biscay firing his torpedoes at a range approximately 2,000 yards. One torpedo hit and the target sank. It is reported that the tanker had been returning to Italy from Brazil.

Whilst on Patrol along the Sicily/Gulf of Sirte route on 20th May 1941 an attack was made on two escorted Italian Merchant Vessels in position 35° 46'N 11° 57E. Four torpedoes were fired of which the first two hit, the third missed and the fourth one also hit. As a result the 4,857 ton PERSEO was damaged and the 5,165 ton ZEFFIRO was sunk. The next day, 21st May 1941, an attack was made on two Italian Cruisers escorted by three destroyers and a torpedo boat in position 35° 30'N 12° 25'E – both of the Cruisers were missed however 1,200 the ton **Destroyer** CURTATONE, which was one of the escorts, was sunk. This patrol ended on 24th May 1941 when HMS URGE returned to Malta.

During the next patrol on 9th Jun 1941 an unsuccessful attack was made on the 3.950 ton German Tanker INGÓ in position 35° 38'N 12° 11'E. The next attack followed on 29th Jun 1941 when damage was claimed on a 10.000 ton Cruiser in position 37° 55'N 15° 35E and, on 2nd Jul 1941 he fired a salvo of four torpedoes at the 6,696 ton BRARÊNA which resulted in one hit and the ship sinking. On 7th Jul 1941 damage was claimed on a 9,000 ton Merchant Vessel in position 37° 48'N 15° 21'E. In another attack on 24th Jul 1941 in position 38° 15'N 13° 24'E a 2,500 ton Tanker was missed.

The attacks continued in August with an attack on 27th Aug 1941 on a Merchant Vessel and the 4,791 ton Italian Tanker AQUITANIA in position 38° 11'N 12° 07'E. The tanker was hit and sank.

Two days later on 29th Aug 1941 an unsuccessful attack was made on the 23,600 ton Italian Liner DUILIO in position 40° 25'N 14° 15'E. The Liner was confirmed as damaged. On a patrol in September an attack was made a 2,500 ton Merchant Vessel (which was missed) on 24th Sep 1941. Overnight 30th September/1st October HMS **URGE** took part in an operation to deliver a package to an agent on a beach in the Gulf of Gioia. It turned out that the agent was a double agent and the officer who was paddling ashore to deliver the package was killed by gunfire from shore. On 2nd Oct 1941 an attack was made on an Italian Submarine of 600 tons in position 38° 43N 12° 52'E. This was also missed. On 22nd Oct 1941 Tomkinson patrolling off Kuriat Island when he sighted a Merchant Vessel which he fired three torpedoes. They were seen and avoided by the target but a fourth torpedo hit and sank the 1,407 ton MARIA POMPEI. On the same day another attack resulted in the sinking of the 5,996 ton MARIGOLA.

An attack on 14th Dec 1941 resulted in one torpedo out off a salvo of four hitting the Italian Battle Ship VITTORIO VENETO in position 37° 52'N 15° 30'E.

Tomkinson had fired at two Battle Ships (the other was the LITTORIO) and had claimed two hits and one possible hit but the VITTORIO VENETO was definitely damaged by one torpedo.

A 3,000 ton Merchant Vessel was missed with a salvo of three torpedoes in position 40° 04N 13° 07.5E on 30th Mar 1942. After this missed torpedo attack Tomkinson surfaced and attacked the ship by gunfire but had to withdraw to avoid damage from return fire.

On 1st April 1942 the 5,070 ton Italian Cruiser GIOVANNI **DELLA BANDA NERE and two** escorting **Destroyers** attacked with a salvo of four torpedoes. Two hits were claimed and the Cruiser was sunk in position 38° 37.5'N 15° One more attack was conducted on 12th April when torpedoes were fired at a two ship convoy. This unsuccessful as the torpedo tracks were sighted by a flying boat acting as the escort and the ships were warned to slow down and stop.

This was the last recorded attack by Tomkinson in HMS URGE. Ön 27th Apr 1942 HMS URGE sailed from Malta but was reported lost whilst on passage from Malta Alexandria on 29th April 1942. At the time of the loss the submarine was carrying ten passengers ratings as addition to the normal crew as part of the evacuation of the 10th Submarine Flotilla from Malta to Alexandria.

JAMES FREEL MEMORIAL



A new Memorial, recognising Barrow born WWII 'Charioteer' James Freel, CGM has been established in Barrow. The Memorial, designed and produced by Ulverston based architectural blacksmith Chris Brammall has been sited at the end of James Freel Close overlooking the Walney Channel.

James Freel and his No. 1 Sub Lieutenant Rod Dove were launched from a submarine on their 'Chariot' to attack Italian ships in the harbour at Palermo in January 1943, during the Second World War. They successfully blew up a troop ship the VIMINALE after getting into the harbour.



The £18,000 steel sculpture represents the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal and includes a propeller, representing torpedo and the Chariot, and heavy anchor chains representing the ships that were targets of the daring pair, who were both captured after the attack and became Prisoners of War.

commemorative plaque, which proudly sits alongside the Borough Barrow Council commissioned Memorial and provides detail about the feat achieved by James Freel and Rodney Dove, was also unveiled by the Mayor Rory McLure accompanied by the Mayoress and James Freel's nephew Mr John Freel MBE.

More than fifty family members including two of James Freel's sisters and his brother and (including friends four members of the Barrow in **Submariners** Furness Association John Hart, Alan Jones, Terry Spurling and Barrie Downer) gathered at James Freel Close for the Ceremony at 1130 on Friday 11th February 2011.

At the Dock Museum after the unveiling John Freel spoke of his pride in his Uncle's achievement. He said: "It is a fantastic occasion for Barrow. It puts Barrow on the map again. We were pleased when they named the street after him and now even more so with the statue. It is in a very appropriate place because he was a Hindpool boy and it is also near the sea."

"It has also been very encourag-

ing to see the interest in the occasion. He is always in our minds and thoughts because he was a hero and now we have a permanent Memorial.

Jimmy Freel's medals including his Conspicuous Gallantry Medal and other Memorabilia were donated to the Barrow Branch of the Submariners Association by the Freel family in 2005 and are currently loaned to the Dock Museum where they are on display for public viewing.

James Freel died in Australia in 1965.

Pingyat Medals for Malaya Service


