

SKorea seeking to sell submarines to Indonesia

South Korea's Defence Minister will soon travel to Indonesia for talks aimed at securing a billion dollar deal to export attack submarines.

Indonesia is working to modernize its aging naval fleet and is interested in buying three 1400 tonne diesel-electric attack subs.

The defence relationship between the two countries appears to have recovered from the embarrassing allegations that South Korean spies broke into the hotel room of senior Indonesian officials, who were in Seoul to discuss Golden Eagle supersonic trainer jets



Bulava failure dismissed

The Russian Navy has energetically dismissed media reports that yet another test firing of a Bulava intercontinental missile has ended in failure.

The reports emerged after the nuclear-powered submarine Yuri Dolgoruky, which normally carries out such tests, performed a sea voyage without firing any weapon system.

A spokesman said on Sunday that a big sub has much else to do during training missions.

The Bulava system is to stand two more acid tests this year. If successful, they should allow the Russian Navy to pass the weapon into service.

HMS ANDREW



FILM STAR: The Barrow-built HMS Andrew featured in two movies and was the last sub to have a deck gun

HMS Andrew (P423) is one of the few Barrow-built boats which can boast about being a film star.

It also holds a host of other claims to fame.

The Amphion-class submarine was launched on April 6 in 1946.

It was fitted with a 4-inch deck gun in 1964 for service during the Indonesia–Malaysia confrontation to counter blockade-running junks.

The gun was fired for the last time in December 1974 and was preserved after the submarine was sold to be broken up in 1977.

HMS Andrew was the oldest submarine of the Amphion class in service and the last UK submarine to carry a deck gun.

She was also the last submarine designed during the Second World War remaining in service and was the first submarine to cross the Atlantic submerged using the 'snort' in May 1953.

The 2,500-nautical-mile trip was made from Bermuda to England and took 15 days in total.

It set a new world record for


continuous underwater operation.

HMS Andrew was used in the 1959 Stanley Kramer film On the Beach to depict the fictional United States Navy nuclear submarine USS Sawfish because the U.S. Navy did not cooperate in the production of the film.

HMS Andrew also appeared as HMS Trojan in the 1950 submarine disaster story Morning Depature – about a sub entangled by a magnetic mine with her trapped crew awaiting rescue.

The U-Boats that Surrendered

U-Boats at Lisahally in Lough Foyle, near Londonderry, N. Ireland.

> 1945 to 1949 By Derek Waller

Introduction

1) In May 1945 the Royal Naval port at Lisahally, in Lough Foyle near Londonderry in

Northern Ireland became a centre of activity for the receipt, processing and ultimate disposal of many of the German U-Boats that had surrendered elsewhere in Europe at the end of the war. The base at Lisahally had previously been used by the Americans during the war, but they had moved out in the autumn of 1944 and it had then been closed. However, in view of the need to accommodate the surrendered German U-Boats, the base was temporarily re-commissioned in May 1945 as HMS Ferret IV. The first Captain (Submarines), Lisahally was Captain R M G Gambier, RN, and he and his staff arrived on 9 and 10 May. The main office and Wardroom were located in Lisahally House, and the ratings were accommodated in the nearby old American camp. There were two jetties available for the U-Boats: the Admiralty Jetty and American Jetty, and the first eight U-Boats arrived on 14 May. From then until February 1946, Lisahally was a hive of U-Boat-related activity before, after the sinking of 30 of the U-Boats off Malin Head, and the disposal of others to Russia, America and France, there were just six remaining. These six U-Boats had been allocated to the Royal Navy for experimental and technical purposes, but all the necessary trials had finished by the end of January 1946, and the six remained in the vicinity of Lisahally until early 1949, when they were declared as surplus to requirements and towed away to various shipbreakers yards in the UK for disposal as scrap later in the vear.

Planning for German Naval Disarmament

2) UK plans for German naval disarmament were initially formulated in 1942 and 1943, and one of the prime objectives was to ensure the total elimination of the Kriegsmarine at the end of the war. It was assumed that Britain would occupy the north west zone in any division of Germany, and that the Royal Navy would

become responsible for the main German naval bases. Thus the RN intended that, at the cessation of hostilities, all surviving German U-Boats would quickly be moved to the UK prior to their disposal. However, Allied agreement was necessary before any final decisions were taken.

3) Despite this, the RN pressed ahead in the first half of 1944 with detailed planning for the post-war transfer of all the surviving German U-Boats to British ports. It was intended that the U-Boats would be moved temporarily to the naval port at Lisahally and to the naval anchorage in Loch Ryan in south west Scotland, whilst the UK sought Allied agreement for the wholesale scrapping or sinking of the U-Boats as early as possible after hostilities ended.

The Surrender Process

- 4) On 4 May 1945 the Kriegsmarine ordered all U-Boats to cease operations and return to Norwegian ports. Thereafter, the surrender of the U-Boats took place in two phases. First, there was the surrender of all German armed forces in Holland, Denmark and north west Germany, which came into effect on 5 May. Then there was the general German surrender which came into effect on 9 May. This led to the Allied order that all U-Boats, including those in Norwegian ports, were to surrender. Those at sea were to head for one of a number of designated reception ports, the prime one of which was Loch Eriboll in north west Scotland.
- 5. Whilst 156 U-Boats surrendered to the Allies on both sides of the Atlantic at the end of the war in Europe, initial interest was focussed on those that were still at sea, and eventually 49 U-Boats put into Allied harbours or surrendered to Allied forces at sea on both sides of the Atlantic.

HMCS Ojibwa



As the 2011 deadline to start clearing the way for the HMCS Ojibwa approaches, the Elgin Military Museum anxiously awaits approval of the submarine's release by the Canadian Navy.

Museum director Ian Raven said approval from the Navy is the only major obstacle in front of his Project Ojibwa team, which is hoping to have the Cold War Oberon-class submarine in Port Burwell before the end of September. "We won't let it in past the end September," Raven said. But before the submarine released to make the two-week trip from Halifax to Port Burwell, the estimated six eight-week process dredging the port and Big Otter Creek to allow for the barge to carry the sub to the shore must be complete to coincide with the Ojibwa's arrival."If we can't get the vessel to Port Burwell in time, we won't go ahead with the dredging."

Environmental restrictions that show sensitivity towards the migratory patterns of certain fish prohibit any dredging of Lake Erie before July 1 and after September, explained Raven.

Project Ojibwa has taken over the process of dredging a 1,219-metre (4,000-foot) long, 18m (60-foot) wide and 3m (10-foot) deep swath of Lake Erie and the creek to make it possible for a shallow water barge to carry the submarine to its new home on the bank of the creek, where it will serve as the main attraction of a new branch of the Elgin Military Museum.

A request for proposals was sent out earlier in the summer for dredging operations that could handle the estimated 40,000 cubic metre job within the specified timeline, but Project Ojibwa can't award the contract until it has approval to take possession of the submarine. "We're on tender hooks here, waiting on approval by the Navy and hoping they will release it in a timely fashion," Raven said.

Project Ojibwa has a shortlist of dredging companies as soon as the Navy approves the sub's release. With six to eight weeks of dredging to complete and little more than eight weeks left until Sept. 30, Raven says his hopes go up "every time the phone rings." "There's a little bit of nail-biting going on here," he said. "For the most part, all we can do is sit here, twiddle our thumbs and hope."

If the dredging cannot begin soon, Raven said the Ojibwa won't be coming to Port Burwell until 2012.

Jocelyn Sweet, a public affairs officer with the Department of National Defence, said the Elgin Military Museum's proposal for the Ojibwa is still under review. "The DND will make a decision in due time," she said, but could not be specific about a timeline. Sweet noted that Ojibwa's two sister subs, the Okanagan and Olympus, are in the process of scrapped in being Port Colborne, Ont., while the **HMCS** Onandaga attraction in Rimouski, Quebec.

Physically, the 91m (300-foot) long, 1,200-ton Ojibwa is ready to be shipped from the east coast, according to Raven, by Heddle Marine, a Hamilton-based company with a dry dock barge pulled by a McKeil Towing tug boat.

In Hamilton, the Ojibwa will be moved onto a smaller barge for the final leg to Port Burwell, which will depend on good weather to make it successful.

Astute V Ambush Charity Football Match

A charity football match was held on Thursday evening in memory of Lieutenant Commander Ian Molyneux, who was shot onboard Barrowbuilt HMS Astute in April.

He was 36 when he died, leaving behind his wife Gill and their four children.

Thursday's event saw the crews of HMS Astute and HMS Ambush, which Lt Cdr Molyneux served on, go head to head on the pitch at Barrow AFC's Furness Building Society stadium.

The crews plan to make the football fundraiser, in aid of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity, an annual event.

It marks an emotional time of year for Mrs Molyneux, who would have celebrated her 11th wedding anniversary with her husband yesterday.

Mrs Molyneux thanked both the Barrow-based Ambush crew and the Astute team, which travelled from Faslane in Scotland, for organising the event.

She said: "It's extremely comforting to see that so many people held Ian in such high regard, and the fact that it's going to be an annual event for years and years to come means that his memory's going to live on for a long time, and that's important for myself and for our children.

"If something positive can come out of what's happened to us, then I know that's what Ian would want.

"Ian never looked back, he always looked forward, and I think by doing this, that's what we're doing."

A touching tribute was paid to Lt Cdr Molyneux, affectionately nicknamed "Moly" among his comrades, as they lined up on the pitch and gave a minute's applause prior to kick-off.

The contest was fierce as Ambush, in white, and Astute, in blue, took full advantage of playing on a professional pitch, and each did their best to emulate AFC's heroic showing on Tuesday.

The crowds who turned out to show their support were kept entertained throughout, and the late afternoon sun shone over Holker Street's main stand, providing the perfect setting for a truly special event.

The match finally ended with victory for HMS Astute after the match went right to the wire.

The score was 2-2 at full time and, after a goalless extra time, the decider fell to a suddendeath penalty shoot-out.

Dan O'Riordan, captain of the HMS Astute team, was presented with the Lt Cdr Ian "Moly" Molyneux shield by Mrs Molyneux.

Mr O'Riordan, who helped organise the event, said: "It was

such a fitting tribute for the last two boats that he served on to play out a really goodmannered, sporting match. It's also fitting that it was so close, because he himself was so close to both boats."




