Gus Britton (1922-1997) was a Royal Navy swimming champion at 100 yrds and 200 yrds and a leading signalman in Submarines who completed 17 war patrols.

On leaving the Navy he was a Butlins redcoat swimming instructor, then became a physical training instructor in France with a ladies convent.

Eventually he returned home to the Royal Navy Submarine Museum where he became respected as a researcher and museum archivist.

At the age of 65 he swam from Stokes bay across to the Isle of White and back to raise money for the Submarine old Comrades Association. Five years later he performed a parachute jump into the Solent for the Submarine memorial fund.

Gus recieved his MBE from the Queen in 1995. Sadly not long afterwards, he died aged 74.

Barrow Submarine Series: issue number 41 HMS B6

AT SEA: HMS B6 served in the First World War

THE Barrow-built submarine *HMS B6* was completed for the Royal

Navy in 1906 as part of the B-class.

B6 was deployed to the Mediterranean soon after the outbreak of the First World War.

Due to a shortage of spare parts this group of submarines was not used until after September 1915.

In 1917 the Italian Navy converted *B6* into to surface patrol boat *S6* to serve in the Adriatic.

The B6 was sold in 1921 to the firm of Francotosti, based in Malta.

This submarine started its short career with diving planes only fitted at the stern.

Other boats in the class had extra planes mounted on the conning tower which improved depth-keeping, surfacing and diving abilities compared to the A-class boats.


These were later exchanged for bow planes; the last boat to receive them being *B6* in January 1916.

The B-class submarines lacked any internal bulkheads which exposed the crew to the petrol engine's exhaust fumes.

Mice were used to detect any concentrations of carbon monoxide inside the hull.

Ventilation was provided for the batteries, but not for the crew's living area.

Crew were only expected to be spend four days on patrol during the summer and three days in winter.

The submarine hulls were tested to a nominal depth of 100ft (30.5m) but the maximum operational depth was considered to be 50ft (15.2m).

The B-class submarines had a single 16-cylinder petrol engine designed to produce 600hp through a single propeller.

Submerged, the submarine used an electric motor powered by battery cells which only kept the boat at full speed for three hours and 45 minutes.

This was increased as more powerful batteries were fitted.

National Draws at the Submarine Museum and the Vickerstown Institute not to **National** various Committee Management meetings at the Union Jack Club and other places.

There was also the Magennis Dinner in Belfast Town Hall where we were well looked after by the Northern Ireland Branch.

Locally there have been all those Dinner Dances and Ladies Nights at the Lisdoonie and now the Abbey House, Barbeques (sadly no longer in our programme nor is the Vickerstown Institute!), Christmas Socials (at the Roose Cons and RBL), Branch Visits to Morecambe Bay, Blackpool, Leyland and Faslane plus the K13 weekends.

So what changes have there been in the Branch?

Various Branch Officers have changed, Membership has increased significantly and some despite fluctuations now averages about 170. Partly the result of the increased Membership the Branch now meets at the RBL in Holker Street and, sadly The Harbour closed soon after we moved and remains shut although more to do with the brewery than us moving on. Branch funds remain healthy and should be more than

sufficient to meet the costs of the Branch 50th Anniversary in 2013 especially with several more fund raising events planned for this year.

What else? Well we managed to complete the Heritage Paintings Collection finishing the task started by Bill Cole, Dave Tull and the others back in 2000. As I write this the documentation for a formal loan of the Paintings Collection to the Council is being finalised with Sabine Skea at the Dock Museum.

We have managed to include all those paintings into the Big Book 'Dive! Dive! Dive! Barrow Built Submarines the Best!'

To date the initial buy of 400 books have been sold more than covering the initial outlay and almost half of the second buy of 100 have also been sold and will benefit Branch funds.

The Branch History has been researched, written included in the History Booklet written to record 'The First Fifty Years of the Submarine Old Comrades Association/Submariners Association' and Branch Members contributed a number of poems which were included in the Anthology Submarine of Poetry' produced for Submariners Association.

Two plans which have not come to fruition despite considerable effort by a large number of Branch Members and other volunteers have been the establishment of the Submarine Heritage Centre and inclusion of HMS ONYX as its centrepiece. The former may yet succeed with good will by all parties but the latter is probably now a lost cause.

At the next Branch Meeting which as you all know is the 49th Annual General Meeting we will vote for the New Secretary, a replacement for John Houlding as Vice Chairman and to confirm in post the volunteers for the Committee.

We will also be getting a round up of events over the last year from the Branch Officers. Mick Dack will give us an update on events at the National Council Conference and advise us who is to be the new National Secretary in place of Dave Barlow who is

standing down from that role after three full terms mind you Dave will be fully occupied as your Branch Chairman and in the arrangements for the 50th Anniversary.

Meanwhile I will take a backseat and take what I think is a well earned rest!

HMS Tally Ho



An amateur antiques collector was shocked to discover a Second World War relic he snapped up for £90 at a car boot sale is worth at least £10,000.

Retired police officer Philip McKeiver, 67, couldn't believe his luck after stumbling across the name plate from a submarine at a village fair near Knutsford.

The HMS Tally Ho was named by Winston Churchill in 1942 and became famous for sinking scores of Japanese and German battleships.

It was decommissioned in 1967 and later sold for scrap but the brass name plate laid un discovered for more than 40 years.

Philip said: "I normally collect medals. But just in the last 12 months or so I've started collecting antiques as well.

"I was at a fair in a small village near Knutsford.

"I was at a stall and this woman said I've not got any medals but I've got this old submarine badge. Instinct just told me to buy it."

Philip, of Royle Green Road, Northenden, bought the badge for just £90 but has since had it valued by auctioneers Sotheby's in London who estimated it to be worth at least £10,000. He is now waiting for it to be authenticated by the Ports mouth Submariners Association and will then decide whether to sell the



item or donate it to a museum.

Philip said: "I was pretty excited when I found out how much it was worth. It's quite an impressive looking piece of equipment.

"I've had lots of interest from museums and collectors. It's just a bit of luck really — it could have gone missing for another 40 years or never been found at all."

The Tally Ho spent most of WW2 hunting down enemy battleships and submarines.

Argentina submarine claim 'baseless', says Nick Clegg

Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg has said "insinuations" by Argentina that the UK sent a nuclear-armed submarine to the South Atlantic are "baseless".

Tensions have been rising in recent months between the two countries over the future of the Falkland Islands.

Argentine Foreign Minister Hector Timerman reportedly told a summit that an "extraregional power" had sent the submarine to the area.

Mr Clegg said Argentina seemed "keen to rattle cages in any way they can".

It is the latest development in an ongoing argument between the UK and Argentina as the 30th anniversary of the Falklands War approaches.

Mr Clegg and Mr Timerman are both attending the international nuclear security summit in the South Korean capital, Seoul.

Treaty

It was reported last month that the UK had deployed a nuclear-powered but conventionally armed Trafalgar class sub marine to the ocean around the Falklands something the Ministry of Defence has refused to confirm or deny.

However, Mr Timerman sub sequently told the United Nations that Britain had, in fact, sent a nuclear-armed Vanguard class submarine in violation of the Treaty of Tlatelolco, which guarantees Latin America as a nuclear weapons-free zone.

British officials said Mr Timerman had repeated the allegation at the meeting in Seoul, referring to an "extra-regional power" which had deployed a submarine "capable of carrying nuclear weapons" in the South Atlantic.

In his address to the conference, Mr Clegg said he was "duty-bound to respond to the insinuations made by the Argentinean delegation of militarisation of the South Atlantic by the British government".

"These are unfounded, baseless insinuations," he said.

"As I'm sure our colleague from Argentina knows, the United Kingdom ratified the protocols to the treaty in 1969... which guarantees a nuclear weaponsfree zone covering Latin America and the Caribbean.

"We have respected those obligations since 1969 and we will continue to do so."

The status of the Falklands, known in Argentina as the Malvinas, is still a highly sensitive issue for Buenos Aires.

It has called on the UK to enter into negotiations over the islands' future something Britain has refused to do.

Escape Equipment



The Survitec Group of Britain reports the Canadian navy has issued a single-source tender for its MK11 Sub marine Escape Immersion Equipment.

"We are extremely proud to supply our Submarine Escape and Immersion Equipment to the (Canadian navy)," said Chris Pugh-Bevan, Submarine Escape and Survival manager at Survitec Group.

We will continue to focus our research and design efforts into SEIE to ensure we maintain our status as world leaders."

The SEIE MK 11 escape suits are an upgrade to the RFD Beaufort MK10 equipment now in use. It allows free ascent from a stricken submarine and provides protection from hypothermia for the submariner on the surface. Components of the suit include an internal thermal liner and gas-inflated single-seat life raft.

With the suit, a sailor can travel toward the surface at a safe rate of about 6-9 feet a second from a depth of about 600 feet.

Survitec said that it is also supplying the Canadian navy with training suits.





Boomers Put Down

Russia has again changed its mind about retiring its Akula ("Typhoon" in the West) SSBNs (nuclear powered ballistic missile subs). Two years ago Russia announced that at least two of the Akulas would be returned to service. But now that the Bulava SLBM (Sea Launched Ballistic Missile) has entered service and the new Borei SSBN has passed its sea trials, the risk of being with too few SSBN has passed. The Akulas are no longer needed and the remaining three will be disposed of. Six of these 24,000 ton "boomers" (missile subs) were built in the 1980s, and three have already been scrapped. The others were to be retired because they were so expensive to operate. Two were retired, and these were the ones to be brought back into service. But in the last two years this was delayed as navy officials struggled with the huge costs.

These boats were the largest submarines ever built and each carried twenty of the huge (16 meters long and 2.4 meters in diameter, 90 ton) R-39 SLBNs. These missiles have all been retired from service. One of the Akulas had some of its missile silos converted to test fire the new Bulava SLBM, to be used on the new Borei SSBNs. The other two Akulas were to be taken out of retirement, with their silos converted to fire the smaller (12.1 meters long and two meters in diameter) Bulava refúrbished SLBM. These Akulas were to remain in service at least until 2019.

The Akulas were built to complement, not replace, the existing Delta IVs and both classes are now to be replaced by new Boreis (which are closer in design to the Delta IVs). The Boreis are 170 meters (558 feet) long and 13 meters (42 feet) in diameter. Surface displacement is 15,000 tons and 16 Bulava SLBMs are carried.

Cost Cutting in a Mess

THE officers' mess, that military sanctuary where senior personnel can unwind with comrades, is to be sacrificed as part of a navy cost-cutting plan.

Chief of Navy Vice-Admiral Ray Griggs has adopted the re commendations of a review into the price of feeding personnel on naval bases.

Traditionally officers and other ranks have dined in separate facilities and have been served alcohol in segregated bars.

Twenty years ago the mess was the heart and soul of the military because most people lived on base but rental allowances have enabled sailors to live nearby, meaning they often go home rather than using military facilities.

Messes are being targeted across the three services in a fresh wave of cost cutting - the army and the RAAF will follow suit.

"The focus of the review has been to ensure that future defence hospitality and catering arrangements remain effective, consistent with contemporary standards, and affordable without impacting upon capability delivery," Admiral Griggs said.

Admiral Griggs also said that Defence spends about \$130 million each year on internal catering and hospitality to provide subsidised meals and refreshments at dozens of military bases.

"On the issue of bar hour opening and closing times, which was also identified as an underutilised service, further analysis is under way and I expect to make an announcement in relation to navy reforms in this area later in 2012," he said. The first base to be affected will be HMAS Penguin at Balmoral followed by HMAS Kuttabul at Garden Island, HMAS Stirling in WA, HMAS Albatross at Nowra, HMAS Cairns in **Oueensland** and **HMAS** Harman in Canberra.




