Sub Spy



A Royal Navy submariner has admitted breaching the Official Secrets Act by collecting classified coding programmes that could be useful to UK enemies. Edward Devenney, 30, originally from County Tyrone, admitted gathering details of "crypto material" programmes used to encrypt secret data.

The petty officer also admitted a charge of misconduct in a public office after he met two people he thought were Russian spies to discuss UK operations.

Devenney was charged under the Official Secrets Act for collecting information for a purpose "prejudicial to the safety or interests of the state" between 18 November 2011 and 7 March 2012.

He contacted a foreign embassy in an attempt to pass infor mation to Russia, on the operation of HMS Trafalgar and two other nuclear submarines.

Devenney denied a second charge under the act of communicating information to another person. This will not be pursued by prosecutors as no secret information was passed on. He admitted arranging to meet the people he thought were Russian secret agents but in fact his meeting was with two British secret service agents.

Devenney will be sentenced on 12 December at the Old Bailey, when parts of the hearing will be held in secret.

The judge, Mr Justice Saunders, told Devenney he would remain in custody until his sentencing.

HMS Excalibur

AT SEA: The Barrow-built HMS Excalibur took part in high-speed trials with peroxide fuel

THE sister boats *Excalibur* and *Explorer* finally proved that high test peroxide fuel was not the future of submarine propulsion – but a small piece from one still serves a useful function.

Excalibur's periscope ended up in the Elie golf course, Earlsferry, on the Scottish east coat when the boat was scrapped.

It continues to do useful work in enabling the club starter to see when the first green is clear for players to tee

The boat is the only one of this name built for the Royal Navy and the name was chosen in honour of the sword of King Arthur of the Arthurian legend.

HMS Excalibur was built at Barrow as an experimental submarine based on a captured German high test peroxide (HTP) powered U-boat.

The *U-1407* had been scuttled following the German collapse at the end of the Second World War, was salvaged and eventually commissioned into the Royal Navy as *HMS Meteorite*.

The recovery provided the impetus for a British research programme leading to the construction of *Excalibur* and *Explorer*.

Built for speed trials, they were unarmed. Their HTP engines were essentially steam turbines, with the steam being generated by the interaction of HTP with diesel oil and a catalyst.

The volatile HTP was carried in special bags outside the inner pressure hull, and were prone to exploding unexpectedly.

The engine room, which was cleared of crew members while under way, would often be the scene of flames appearing on the top of the combustion chamber.

The fuel proved to be so troublesome that the boats quickly became known as Exploder and Excruciator.

Both *Excalibur* and her sister ship were fitted with the latest underwater escape technology, including a one-man escape chamber, and equipped with up-

to-date escape breathing apparatus.

The two boats were popularly known as the 'blonde' submarines because of their hair dye hydrogen peroxide fuel.

They served a useful purpose as highspeed targets for the Royal Navy's antisubmarine forces.

Both were part of the 3rd Submarine Squadron but operated independently with the help of their own depot ship and a fuel carrier.

SAA Qld Inc Project

I do not know if you have heard, but SAA Qld Inc. has been undertaking a project by the title of "Submariners Walk" which has taken about 400 metres of the Brisbane River banks and in conjunction with the Brisbane City Council has turned the area into Remembrance Walk. Dear Sir,

September 2013 marks the 70th anniversary of one of the most and audacious daring operations of the Second World War. 'Operation Source' was the attack by midget submarines, or X-craft, on the pride of the German battlefleet, Tirpitz. Moored in her protected lair in Alten fjord in northernmost Norway she was deemed by many to be beyond the reach of any allied forces. In the submarines operation, two successfully attacked the ship, and caused immense damage. The commanders of both X-craft received the Victoria Cross.

Lieutenant Godfrey Place VC was commander of X7, and the story of his life will be published in November 2012. Entitled 'Midget Submarine Commander, The Life of Godfrey Place, VC' it is to be published by Pen & Sword, Barnsley, Yorkshire.

Godfrey place has a strong attachment to Barrow; not only did he serve with X-craft, but he also served in 4 U-class boats with the 10th flotilla at Malta, from 1941 to 1942. These were:

OPR Sokol (ex HMS Urchin) HMS Urge HMS Una HMS Unbeaten

Godfrey Place was the only naval officer who went to war in submarines, in surface ships and in airplanes-he was a Fleet Air Arm pilot in the Korean War. He was also a prisoner of war. He was the last serving member of the Royal Navy to hold the Victoria Cross, and retired in 1970. On retirement he was the Chairman of the Victoria Cross and George Cross Association for over 20 years.

I would like to draw this book to the attention of you and members of your association who might find it of interest.

If you and your colleagues felt they would like to know more about the life of this remarkable naval officer, then I would be very willing to come and talk about the book if you so wished.

France Developing SAMs

France is now developing SAMs (surface to air missiles) systems for submerged diesel-electric submarines under attack by fixed helicopters wing or aircraft. One system uses a periscope-like device pushes a missile launcher above the water where one or more Mistral (similar to the U.S. Stinger) missiles are fired at any nearby helicopters or low flying aircraft. A second system launches a larger Mica missile via a torpedo-like device. While Mistral has a max range of six kilometers, the Mica (normally carried by jet fighters) has a range of up to 80 kilometers.


The French are pretty confident these systems will work, as similar weapons have been developed and built (but never actually used) before. For four example, years successfully Germany tested IDAS (Interactive Defense and Attack system for Submarines) by launching an anti-aircraft missile from a submerged submarine (U-33, a Type 212 equipped with Air Independent Propulsion). IDAS is still in development and not expected to enter service for at least two more years.

The IDAS anti-aircraft missile is 2.45 meters (7.6 feet) long, 180mm in diameter, and weighs

118 kg (260 pounds). It has a 13.2 kg (29 pound) warhead and a range of at least 15 kilometers. The main targets will be ASW (Anti-Submarine) helicopters and low flying ASW aircraft. Two IDAS missiles fit into a metal frame that in turn fits into a torpedo tube. The IDAS missiles take about a minute to reach the surface, ignite its rocket motor, spot any target within range, and go after it. If the IDAS misses, the air bubble from the torpedo tube launch of the missile will reach the surface, indicating where the sub is. At that point the helicopter or aircraft can drop a The sub torpedo. countermeasures for these torpedoes but these devices are nof guaranteed to work every time, or against every type of torpedo (some are better at detecting, and getting around, countermeasures).

The sub commander would use IDAS if he calculated that a helicopter was likely to spot him with active sonar sonobouys or dipping sonar. IDAS can also be aimed at a surface ship (as in the bridge or a helicopter sitting on the platform at the rear of the ship. This is done using the fiber optic link, which can be used to designate a target. Otherwise, the missile uses its heat seeking sensor.

Even when missile systems like this are available for use, it's uncertain if any navy will buy them. The concept of anti-aircraft missiles for subs is several decades old and never actually used. But it's possible, so new models keep showing up.





Jolly Roger

Jolly Roger flag flown a top a World War Two submarine has resurfaced after going missing for 40 years.

The flag was last flown on HMS Tantalus at the end of the war in 1945 and was given to the boat's youngest submariner, telegraphist Jack Brown, at the end of its service.

But the Jolly Roger went missing following Jack's death four decades ago and has only just been found again by his delighted son Gordon in his sister's attic.

He now wants to see the flag flying again. Mr Brown, 66, from Gosport, Hampshire, said: 'I was so pleased to have found it again, especially in such good condition.

'I thought it had been lost but I'd been nagging my sister to look for it and thankfully it turned up in her attic.

'Someone offered my £1,000 for it but I will never sell it.

'I want to see it flying again as it would be the first time since 1945 and then I will give it to a museum perhaps.'

The history of HMS Tantalus is told by the symbols on the flag, with four bars representing the torpedoing of four ships and two daggers denoting the submarine's two 'cloak and dagger' operations.

The eight stars in the top right corner surrounding crossed cannons represent eight times the deck gun was fired. Mr Brown's father joined HMS Tantalus, which was a T-class submarine, at the age of 18. Gordon said: 'When my dad died he gave me the flag, a life jacket and his medals.

'I was only young at the time and I think I traded his medals for some marbles, which earned me a clip round the ear.

'I wish I hadn't given away the medals now but at least I've still got the flag.'

The first use of a Jolly Roger on a British submarine was in 1914 after it successfully torpedoed a German cruiser ship.

The act was a humorous response to Admiral Sir Arthur Wilson's remark that submarines were 'damned un-English' and crews of enemy subs would be hanged as pirates.

During World War Two British subs were allowed to fly the Jolly Roger on the day of their return from a successful patrol.

The oldest surviving Jolly Roger flag, from First World War submarine E54, is on display at the Royal Navy Submarine Museum in Portsmouth.

The Jolly Roger dates back to the 1700s when pirates flew it to make their victims surrender readily. HMS Tantalus was launched in February 1943 and served in the Far East for much of its wartime career.

The submarine sank a long list of other vessels during its time in service including the Malaysian tug Kampung Besar and the Pulo Salanama in April 1944 and several Japanese Army cargo ships.

The craft survived the war intact but was scrapped at Milford Haven in November 1950.

RUSSIAN HYDROGEN FUELED SUBMARINES!

The new Russian submarine is called the B-90 Sarov, which is really a test sub using a hydrogen-fueled power plant which would be similar to German submarines U-212 and U-214. The advantage to this technology is that some of Russia's traditional diesel-electric subs use batteries to supply the electric motor. When the battery needs to be recharged, the submarine must surface and start diesel engines to recharge the batteries. This makes the submarine vulnerable. With hydrogen-fuelled engines, the electric motors are supplied by hydrogen fuel cells. This new Russian engine is what is referred to as 'airindependent propulsion,' which increases the submarine's submersible time, is quieter and could compete with the German diesel submarines, some of which Israel possesses. Fuel cells are electrochemical conversion devices that combine hydrogen and oxygen to produce water, electricity and heat. They're already in use in some automotive and space applica-tions. While slow, AIP sub-marines will be useful for their long-endurance and quietness. They will not become the primary form of propulsion to either diesel or nuclear power. Yet, they will be good for coastal defence and littoral regions, especially smaller in **Edward** Dr. marines. Whitman, science editor of Undersea Warfare Magazine, sees fuel cells possibly doubling or tripling their capabilities in the next few years, which will give greater tactical flexibility due to their small size and inherent stealth nature. 'The novel operational paradigms (that) AIP submarines introduce to undersea warfare will make these new boats dangerous threat to submariners accustomed conventionally nuclear, or diesel-powered adversaries. Whitman said. 'The submarine force needs to understand this threat, where it's been, where it's going, what it means, and how to counter it.'

First & Last

The First Escape

In 1851 a corporal in the Prussian Light Horse Artillery, Wilhelm Bauer, who was a carpenter by trade, built a steel sheet submarine machine. On its 2nd journey it failed to surface after diving. However the threeman crew were still alive and entombed in the machine on the seabed. Bauers rudimentary knowledge of theoretical physics suggested a solution. If the air inside the submersible equalled the pressure of the water outside the hull, the hatch could be pushed open. Which it was! Thus, Wilhelm Bauer, Wilhelm Thomsen and Freidrich Witt gained their place in history as the first men to escape from a sunken submarine.
