

On completion of the Service all participants are invited to the reception held either in the APEX Hotel courtesy of Dundee City Council. We hope to welcome many representatives again from the UK and foreign Navies and Submarine Associations and join us for this prestigious event. For those that decide to stay overnight in Dundee we are pleased to advise that there are many places of interest in Dundee including good restaurants and bars to visit. - g. TSF 2023 Funding Snapshot: Thank you for continuing to support your family. Your generosity has permitted us to support over 5000 submariners, veteran submariners, and their families since May 2022 in varying projects. In 2022 (we launched in May 22) we awarded £35k in minor grants. £14,500 in welfare grants, £33k was awarded to We Remember Submariners, Friends of the Submarine Museum and the Submariners Association in association grants. In 2023 so far, we have awarded £58k in minor grants to support, Homecomings, Unit refurbishments, Remembrance events, Heritage protection, £14,500 in unit welfare grants, £4k in Herbie Lott awards (an award to recognize those who have improved the way the RN/RM forces operate). We have supported 6 families to go away on a well-deserved break, supported veterans with addictions and support needs across the UK, delivered five hundred hampers to partners of those deployed on RN Submarines and 52 people have been given free access to online mental health support courses.
- h. **TSF Website:** MindWorks have been working to transfer the TSF website portal into WordPress from Mindtype. MindWorks are beginning that process next week. The site will be frozen on the 22nd and 23rd of August for data transfer, so the website will not be accessible for the public or those with Admin rights. The plan is to go live on Thursday 24th August; however, there still may be a few minor issues with data for a couple of weeks, so it is advised that

#### i. Request for help:

Dear Sirs,

I am writing to seek any assistance the Submariners Association may be able to provide regarding HMS Churchill and HMS Resolution. I work for the Royal British Legion in the War Pension Advocacy Department. I am currently representing the widow of a deceased submariner who served for some 20 years in The Royal Navy, and specifically on these two boats.

The information that is sought relates to the specific job roles and training for the job roles of ALOEM and LWEM(O), and the likely radiation such a person may have been exposed to during service on these boats. (HMS Churchill - Jan 1974 to Nov 1976, OEM & ALOEM, and Nov 1984 to Nov 1987 – LWEM(O)) & (HMS Resolution Dec 1978 to Feb 1982 – LWEM(O))

Specifically, I have been asked by the Armed Forces Compensation 1st Tier Tribunal to see if any assistance can be obtained in the following areas of expertise:

The training for the specific role of OEM & WEM

The onboard jobs performed or likely to have been performed by an OEM & WEM (Including Nuclear Power Plant Operator)

The Training for the specific role of WEM(O) is "Operations of sections of the Polaris Weapon System, Including, Lunch System, Missile Ejection, Lunch Control and Missile Environmental Monitoring".

The onboard jobs performed or likely to have been performed by a WEM(O) in conjunction with the above.

Any known incidents which may have resulted in individuals being exposed to more radiation than would otherwise be mandated.

Please note that this has been requested by the tribunal panel and not by either party. The tribunal panel are an inquisitorial panel that tries to ascertain facts and decide if the decision made by the Secretary of State in respect of a former service member is correct.

I would be most grateful for any assistance that could be given, even if it is only to refer me to someone who may be able to assist further.


#### M/V VALHALLA Divers identify WW1 U-boat at 104m

Divernet, Scuba News Wrecks

July has been quite a month for scuba diving beyond 100m to explore significant wrecks. The latest such technical dive has taken place off Shetland, with the positive identification of a deep-lying U-boat sunk by Royal Navy warships during World War One. Rebreather divers from the Orkney-based diving liveaboard MV VALHALLA became the first to visit the German mine-layer SM UC-55 on 21 July – at a maximum depth of 104m.

The 415-tonne UC-11-class submarine was commissioned into the German Imperial Navy in November 1916. Fifty metres long, it carried 27 crew and was fitted with six 39in mine-tubes with 18 mines; one stern and two bow 20in torpedo -tubes with seven torpedoes; and a 3.5in deck-gun.

Over six patrols, UC-55 had already been credited with sinking nine merchant ships and damaging two more, as well as the destroyer HMS ALBACORE in the months before it met its end off Shetland on 29 September 1917. The submarine had been about to start laying mines about eight miles south-east of Lerwick, in the convoy channel between Orkney and Shetland, when a trim problem led it to dive beyond its 50m operating depth.

The forward compartment flooded as a result, forcing the U-boat to surface but leaving it unable to manoeuvre because the batteries had failed. Two Royal Navy destroyers, HMS TIRADE and HMS SYLVIA, and the armed trawler MORAVIA shelled and finally depth-charged the German sub. It sank with the loss of 10 lives, including its commander Oberleutnant zur See Horst Ruhle von Lilienstern, and 17 men were taken prisoner.

The wreck-site had been picked up on a side-scan sonar survey in 1985, lying upright to 5.6m off the seabed, but because of its depth it would have proved challenging to dive at the time. VALHALLA's owner and captain Hazel Weaver says that the technical dive-team had spent a decade planning their dive to check out the wreck. The divers were Jacob Mackenzie, Toni Norton, John & Tracy Timperley, Craig Stevenson, Thomas Zloch and Martin Mako Janećek, all diving on closed-circuit rebreathers except for Tracy Timperley, who was back-up diver and on open circuit. Their efforts on the day were backed up by the VALHALLA crew of Helen Hadley and Brandon Rowlands, with the support of wreck-researchers Kevin Heath and Wayne Allen.

The team enjoyed a bottom-time of around 35 minutes on the wreck and succeeded in putting its identity beyond doubt. Details of the damage inflicted on UC-55 had been recorded by the crews of the British warships, which had struck first the conning-tower and then the hull. "The dive went very well, with no problems arising," Weaver told Divernet. "Vis

was 25m at depth." The divers spotted many live torpedoes and mines, and the Video footage captured by Mackenzie shows many details of the well-colonised submarine, including the deck-gun and hatch openings.

He said of his footage: "Not my best Video, but this was a hard one – long swim down the line in current and a very limited bottom-time." This is captured in the first six minutes of darkness before the lights pick up fishing-nets, and the subsequent footage of the submarine as the divers move rapidly around the wreck-site is compelling.

#### Contract for First Phase of AUKUS Submarines build agreed with BAE

The Government has awarded a design contract to BAE to assemble submarines as part of a major agreement with America and Australia. AUKUS submarines are due to be built in Barrow as part of the agreement which will see Australia work with the two countries to develop new submarines. According to reports, a contract for the 'detailed design and long lead items' was signed with BAE. It represents the first stages of work on the Ship Submersible Nuclear AUKUS, the future class of attack submarines that will replace the Astute class boats. Details of the contract were shared in a Ministry of Defence minute to parliament.

It said: "The purpose of this Minute is to notify Parliament of reportable contingent liabilities that the Ministry of Defence (MOD) intends to incur as a result of placing the Detailed Design and Long Lead Items contract with BAE Systems for the Ship Submersible Nuclear AUKUS (known as "SSN-A"), the future class of attack submarines to replace the Astute Class

"Negotiations are ongoing and the contingent liabilities will come into force on signature of the contract." The first phase of the work includes fabrication of steel in Barrow.

As part of the AUKUS pact, the UK's submarines will primarily be constructed in Barrow, while Australia will work on developing its submarine industrial base over the next decade.

Australian submarines are due to be built in Adelaide, South Australia, with some components produced in the UK. BAE will play a key role in the programme and is expanding its workforce by 6,000 staff.

The Government announced British involvement in building submarines as part of the agreement in March. The next generation of Barrow-built hunter-killer submarines, SSNR, will be used by both the UK and Australian navies. Until the SSNR submarines are built, President Joe Biden announced that Australia will be buying up to five Virginia-class submarines from the US.

#### Barrow MP Meets Australian High Commission

As the Chair of the APPG AUKUS in Parliament it was an honour to lead a small cross-party delegation to Australia House to discuss our shared interests and help to build the understanding and relationships that will matter so much to the UK, to the world, and to Furness, for generations to come.

#### **OPERATION SOURCE -SEPTEMBER 1943**

#### **Operation SOURCE**

In September 1943 six in Number X-Craft - each manned by a Passage Crew of three were towed by six Submarines - each of which carried an X-Craft Operational Crew of four - in addition to their normal crew. The X-Craft were to attack German Capital Ships in the Kaa Fjord in Norway. The Operational Crew were to relieve the Passage crews when the Submarines and X-Craft reached the area of the Kaa Fjord. In all (apart from the Towing Submarine Crew) forty-two X-Craft personnel took part in Operation Source – eighteen Passage Crew Members and twenty-four Operational Crew Members. The X-Craft were:

#### HM Submarine X-5

This submarine participated in the attack on the German Battleship TIRPITZ in Kaa Fjord, Northern Norway on Wednesday 22nd September 1943. Submarine X-5 left Port Bannantyne on 18th September 1943 and was towed to the operational area by **HMS THRASHER** 

(Lieutenant A. R. Hezlet, RN). The Operational Crew took over from the Passage Crew for the approach to the target and the attack. Lieutenant Henty-Creer (the CO) is believed to have made his way into the area around the TIRPITZ but was not seen again. The Passage Crew returned home in HMS THRASHER. Submarine X5 was lost with its Operational Crew - who were all awarded Mentions in Dispatches - were:

Lieutenant Henty Henty-Creer, RNVR Sub Lieutenant Tom John Nelson, RNVR Acting Sub Lieutenant Alastair David Malcolm, RNVR

ERA 4th Class Ralph James Mortiboys O/N P/MX79142

#### Submarine X-6

This submarine participated in the attack on the German Battleship TIRPITZ in Kaa Fjord, Northern Norway on Wednesday 22nd September 1943. Submarine X-6 was towed to the operational area by **HMS TRUCULENT** 

(Lieutenant Commander R L Alexander, RN). The Operational Crew took over from the Passage Crew for the approach to the target and the attack. The Passage Crew returned home in HMS TRUCULENT. The attack was successful. All four of the Operational Crew survived, were rescued by the Germans, and become Prisoners of War but Submarine X6 was sunk. Lieutenant Cameron (the CO) was awarded the Victoria Cross, Sub Lieutenants Lorimer and Kendall were each awarded the DSO and ERA Goddard the CGM.

#### Submarine X-7

This submarine participated in the attack on the German Battleship TIRPITZ in Kaa Fjord, Northern Norway on Wednesday 22nd September 1943. Submarine X7 was towed to the Operational Area by HMS STUBBORN (Lieutenant Arthur Anthony Duff RN). Operational Crew took over from the Passage Crew for the approach to the target and the attack. The attack was successful, and the TIRPITZ was badly damaged but not sunk. Two of the Operational Crew survived and were rescued by the Germans and become Prisoners of War but the other two of the crew were lost and Submarine X6 was sunk. Lieutenant Place (the CO) was awarded the Victoria Cross, Sub Lieutenant Aitken was awarded the DSO. Lieutenant Whittam and ERA Whitley (who were both lost) were posthumously Mentioned in Dispatches.

#### Submarine X8

On 17th September 1943, whilst on passage to Norway for an attack on the German Pocket Battleship LUTZOW, Submarine X8 which was being towed by **HMS SEANYMPH** (Lieutenant J P H Oakley, DSC, Royal Navy), lost its trim, and became out of control. The Commanding Officer of X8 traced the problem to a flooded Starboard 'Side Charge' and decided to jettison the charge. This exploded about a thousand yards astern of X8 (although the charge was set to 'Safe') but caused no damage to the submarine. The Port 'Side Charge' then began to flood and was also jettisoned. This exploded some three miles astern of X8, but this time damage was incurred. A decision was taken to scuttle X8, which was of no further use in the TIRPITZ attack.

Both the Passage and Operational Crews returned home in HMS SEANYMPH

#### Submarine X-9

Overnight 15th/16th September 1943 Submarine X-9 was being towed by Submarine HMS SYRTIS (Lieutenant M H Jupp, DSC, Royal Navy) en-route to attack the German Pocket Battleship SCHARNHORST. On being ordered to surface on the morning of 16th September X-9 failed to surface and was presumed lost on tow. ERA Vernon Coles, of the Operational Crew, reported that he thought the towing rope probably parted at about 0600 and that the consequent increase in shaft revolutions in SYRTIS (although noted by the ERA of the Watch) was not reported to the Control Room. As a result, SYRTIS did not start a search for X-9 for several more hours. X-9 was never seen again, and the Passage Crew were all lost. The Operational Crew returned home in HMS SYRTIS. The lost Passage Crew Members were:

#### Submarine X-10

Submarine X-10 was intended (with Submarine X-9) to participate in an attack on the German Pocket Battleship SCHARNHORST in Kaa Fjord in Northern Norway. The submarine was towed to the Operational area by HMS SCEPTRE (Lieutenant I S McIntosh RN). The Passage Crew were then relieved by the Operational Crew for closing to the attack area and for the attack. The approach to the attack area was affected by a number of defects to the submarine systems, which eventually led to the abandonment of the attack. Lieutenant Hudspeth and his crew managed to exit the area and to achieve a rendezvous with Submarine HMS STUBBORN (Lieutenant A A Duff, RN) and hand X-10 over to the Passage Crew for the tow back home. Owing to poor weather the Passage Crew were recovered to HMS STUBBORN and X10 was ordered to be scuttled.


The X- and XE-Class submarines were conceived during the Second World War: around 51ft (16m) long, they were designed to be towed by a 'mother' submarine and use their small size to complete stealth missions, such as attacking harbours and performing reconnaissance. Although they would not begin active service until 1942, the submarine crews achieved quite the record, racking up 167 honours between them, including four Victoria Crosses.

Written by ex-submariner **Keith Hall**, **X3 to X54** is a look at the entire life and evolution of the British midget submarine, from its early prototypes to its final journeys. With a wealth of imagery, including

archive X-craft photographs as well as up-to-date views of the X51 (HMS Stickleback) from the Scottish Submarine Centre, this is the fascinating, yet little-known, story of Britain's midget submarines.



#### Return to RALEIGH offer for former sailors trained at Torpoint

Did you serve at HMS RALEIGH and fancy a trip down memory lane – whilst also encouraging a new generation of Royal Navy sailors?

Then a new initiative introduced by the Torpoint establishment this autumn will be right up your street. Once a term, the base is going to open its gates for a small number of former personnel to revisit old haunts, as well as watch a group of recruits pass out of basic training on RALEIGH's sprawling parade ground at the beginning of their naval careers.


Given that the base has been around since WW2 and has been the premier RN establishment for turning civilians into junior ratings since the mid-1970s... hundreds of thousands of men and women have passed through RALEIGH before starting their professional training as chefs, seamen, engineers, aircraft handlers, medics, divers and more.

RALEIGH's Commanding Officer Captain Jane Roe is keen to open up access to the site for veterans eager for a nostalgia trip, but also to show them how training has evolved to meet the expectations of young men and women of 2023... and meet the demands of the Fleet in which they serve.

Due to pressures of time and the demands on personnel on pass-out day, there will not be the chance to visit old blocks, dine in the senior rates' mess or drop in on the bar, or visit some of the more distant training facilities like Jupiter Point, the fire school or Pier Cellars. But you will watch a training video to show how the Royal Navy of 2023 turns civilians into sailors, watch successful recruits receive their epaulettes, and tour a messdeck which is home to trainees for ten weeks. After eating (paid for by yourself/or a packed lunch) you'll move to the parade ground (or drill shed if it's raining) for the passing-out parade. Throughout you'll be hosted by members of local Royal Naval Associations who also provide moral and physical support to trainees to help them attain their goal of passing out.

The first opportunity to 'return to RALEIGH' will be on Friday October 6. The initiative is planned for once a term initially and is only available to individual visitors, not groups (the latter are dealt with/hosted by HMS RALEIGH's Executive Department). Space will be limited to 15 veterans, plus one friend/carer, with allocations made on a first-come, first-served basis.

Veterans should be reasonably mobile and not overly dependent on medical care, although wheelchairs can be accommodated. And you're encouraged to wear medals and veteran's badges.
